- Winters v. U.S., 207 U.S. 564, 28 S.Ct. 207, 52 L.Ed. 340 (1908)
- McCarran Amendment, (1952), 43 U.S.C.A. sec. 666
  Waived U.S. sovereign immunity defense to be joined in state court lawsuits for river basin water right determinations.

### A New Era

• Endangered Species Act, 16 U.S.C. §1531 et seq. (1973). • Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. §1251 et seq. (1972). Waters of the United States (WOTUS) **CWA WQS Tribal Reserved Rights** CWA Baseline WQS - National Water Right Settlement • In 1983, DOI internal policy memo, '...reward tribes that negotiate; punish those that litigate' (McCool). Negotiation = Compromise; Win Win vs. Lose Lose


